

Yet another branch of The Carlisle and Cumberland


Banking Company, Sadly, we don't appear to have a precise year during which the branch was opened, only 'Pre-1911' and wonder if anyone can provide a

I have particularly fond memories of Keighlev branch. as it is where I started mv Martins' career in August 1966. Originally opened



Some names to remember for our Liverpool, Northern and Craven District members (not forgetting our wider golfing fraternity) are: Frank Wade, Eric Shackleton, Geoff Brogden, Julian Taylor, Eric Ellison, Ray Hopwood, Deryk Ingham, Ken Marsden, Bert Denton and Lindsay Mason.

#### Kendal



We are fortunate in having two photographs of our Kendal branch, which must surely be our oldest branch still in existence (at least for time-being). the Opened on 1st January 1788 by John Wakefield & Sons and immediately had

Crewdsons Bank. which opened on the same day. Competition must have been too great they as amalgamated in 1840 to create Wakefield Crewdson and Company, The Kendal Bank (not a name that easily flows off your tongue) but



shortened to The Kendal Bank. Customers included High Street names; K Shoes and Provincial Insurance. Names that you might remember are: C Clark and John Burnside. So, after almost 240 years of serving the local community its days are numbered.

# Llandudno

One of our 'youngest' branches and the last in Wales. Opened in 1938 and managed for 14 years from 1952 by RTM Williams. He is

remembered in the Autumn 1957 edition of The Martins Bank Magazine: In the Queen's **Birthday** Honours List the award of OBE to Mr R T M Williams, Manager of our Llandudno Branch. appears. Mr Williams invited has been to represent the 53rd Welsh



Infantry Division (TA) at the annual war memorial service at Hertogenbosch in Holland on 25 October, being the anniversary of the liberation of the town in 1944 by his division, a battle in which Mr Williams took part. On Sunday 28 July, the BBC visited the Ancient Borough of Flint in the "Down Your Way" programme. One of the calls was at the castle where the 372ND Flint and Denbigh Yeomanry have a Battery Headquarters. As Officer Commanding, Colonel R T M Williams was asked to meet Franklin Engelmann to talk about the Regiment and about the celebration of the tenth anniversary of the conferment of the Freedom of the Borough upon it, which took place on 31st August.

Preston, 38 Fishergate



Sadly, no longer the original building, which was opened in 1869 as the Head office of Preston the Union Bank before merging with the Lancashire and Yorkshire

## Ramsey, Isle of Man



The former branch of the Manx Bank was opened in 1882 before becoming a branch of The Mercantile Bank of Lancashire in 1900 and The Lancashire & Yorkshire Bank in 1904 and finally amalgamating with Martins in 1928. Although I don't think that we still have

many members living on the Isle of Man, perhaps some of our Liverpool colleagues might have served there and remember RA Henry who worked at the branch

between 1964 and 1968. More memories would again be appreciated from any member who worked there or at other Isle of Man branches. Which brings us, finally, to our last remaining branch:

Worcester, 54 High Street Then



A relatively 'young' branch, having been opened on 30<sup>th</sup> March 1937, it was closed on day of our takeover (12<sup>th</sup> December 1969). But, like a 'Phoenix rising from the ashes' in 1975, we will have to wait and see if it is akin to the mythical bird that was given a new life and hope for the future. Dear David

Reading the Spring edition of the Grasshopper Magazine and the above article the "Youngest" & the "Oldest", I think I can beat the youngest, May 1952.

I was born in the 'Coronation Year' in August 1953, which makes me 70!

I started my career at Martins Bank, Sale branch on 6<sup>th</sup> August 1969. I submitted a story of my first day at work sometime ago, I'm not sure if it was ever included in past newsletters.

I hope I can beat 1952. No doubt you will let me know. Hilary Currah

Well, Hilary, you are still our youngest member and, possibly, the youngest ex-member of Martins staff. Who knows?

Now Hilary's memories with additions from Jonathan:

#### Definitely a TRUE Martini!

I suppose I can't really call myself a true Martini\*



as I didn't join Martins Bank until 6th August 1969, when I started to work there four months before the merger in December 1969. I was

told to present myself at Sale branch on Northenden Road for 9am, but when I arrived the doors were firmly closed. No-one had explained they didn't open until 9.30am! Panic, what do I do now? Luckily a member of staff turned up and let me in. So began my first day of work for Martins Bank. I was taken under the wing of Barbara Slater nee Griffin who along with Hugh Oldham showed me the debit clearing. After that was listed and dispatched, Barbara explained how debits and credits worked, which seemed to take all day and by the end of it I was none the wiser!

As a Junior (that was your title when you first joined the Bank), I had to make Tea and Coffee for the rest of the staff, list the rems\* and balance them, and make up the post. By the end of the day at 5pm, I was ready to go home. Wrong again! Noone had told me you only went home when everything balanced. About 6pm the phone rang, it was my Mum wondering where I was. Unfortunately the Manager Arthur Jackson (who made exceedingly good cakes) answered the phone (he did that frequently) and he was not happy! He basically told me in front of the whole branch no-one went home until everything was balanced and put away. Eventually we were done and I went home exhausted. Here ended my first day.

As well as the normal Junior duties, making drinks, balancing the rems, doing the post and every week balancing the stamps (they never did!) I had to make up Customer's statements. As this was in the days before Computerisation they had to be prepared by hand and the envelopes addresses accordingly. In those days customers had their cheques and dividends returned with their statements, invariably there would be at least one statement missing an item, usually for a business account customer. As they all wanted their statements at the same time, usually lunch-time, it was like juggling with snow! Mr Jackson was given the statements to check they were made up properly and the envelopes addressed correctly. Woe-betide you if you spelt a name wrong or a customer's address was incorrect or incomplete. My biggest faux pas was when preparing statements one day for a well-known business account was to send one of the Director's personal statements to them "c/o The Secretary". I didn't make that mistake again. By then Mr Jackson had retired and our Manager was Jim Kay he wasn't best pleased with me. The most important thing to remember when doing statements was to tear off the side piece making sure you had written the final balance on it along with the customer's name, then leave it on a spike for the machine room girls to prepare a new statement.

It really doesn't matter how long you worked for Martins Hilary, it's simply the fact that YOU DID that matters and you remember that you did.

I wonder if any of our members also worked at Sale branch and remember Hilary's colleagues, which I have highlighted in red?

#### **Obituary** : Allan Townsend



**Rugby** Gloucester was saddened to hear of passing Allan the Townsend, а past President and captain of Gloucester Rugby. Allan was born in Cheltenham in 1933. played for the town club

from 1951 to 1959, and was captain from 1957 to 1959. Over that period, he won five Gloucestershire caps, playing in all four of the County's games in *1954-55.* He played once for Gloucester in September 1956 against Bucharest, who were touring the country at the time. Allan left Cheltenham to join Gloucester permanently for the start of the 1959-60 season. He was an immediate success and became the regular tight-head prop. That season Gloucester won 13 consecutive games (a club record), and Allan was an essential part of that team. In just five seasons Allan made 196 appearances. He was club captain in the 1961-62 season. His final appearance was on 24 October 1964 against Coventry.

Allan also played a total of 18 games for Gloucestershire; his final one being in 1964 against Lancashire in a Championship semi-final.

Allan served on the Gloucester committee from 1983-96. He was also a member of the Gloucestershire committee for 18 years, and member of the RFU committee from 1991-97.

Allan Townsend was President of Gloucester Rugby from 2008 to 2013.

His club was the Nell Gwynne/Gargoyle club in Dean St, Soho (later the Comedy club) We were served sandwiches etc. by topless ladies and then Don lead us in for the show. It consisted of bare bosomed ladies in some costume miming along to 1950's hits like "I'm an Indian Too", Betty Hutton - I'm An Indian, Too (1950) (youtube.com) Fairly camp stuff if I'm honest, anyway Mr and Mrs Willis were sitting in the row behind us (girls from the 'mech room' and counter) and I remember hearing her say "Do you think this is appropriate for these young girls Clive?"
